Autistic adults face high levels of loneliness and poor mental health.

A national study* found that 81% of autistic people feel lonely and many say they would feel less isolated if they had better support.

In Hampshire, things are even harder. Rural areas, poor public transport, and limited internet access make it difficult for people to meet others, get support, or access services.

Autistic people are also more likely to have serious health problems, and their life expectancy is, on average, 16 years shorter than non-autistic people. Around 70% have at least one mental health condition**.

Ways to fundraise

Solo challenges

Car wash, quiz night, car boot sale, sports competition, name the teddy game, coffee morning, vehicle rally, come dine with me, golf tournament, guess how many sweets in a jar, scavenger hunt, games evening.



Planning a successful event

Whether you are planning a cake sale, fundraising through a challenge event or organising a sponsored car wash here are a few things to consider:

Plan ahead. Allow enough planning time for large events for things to run smoothly. Think about the size of your event. If you are planning a big event why not form a fundraising team? We're here to help!

Targets and budgets. Set yourself a realistic fundraising target and stick to a budget. Minimise costs by trying to get as many goods/services as possible for free or at a discount by asking local companies to help.

Guests. Consider who you are going to invite and if there will be a cost per person. Do you need to confirm numbers with others involved in the organising of the event such as the venue?

When? Check that your fundraising event won't clash with any major sporting, social events or public holidays unless you are planning your activity around them.

Where? Choose a venue carefully. If it is going to be a big event, then you might need to hire a venue but remember to keep at minimal costs as this will come out of your fundraising income.

- Gift Aid details If you have not collected donations online, please don't forget to keep accurate records of your sponsors and donations via your sponsorship form and send this to us so we can claim gift aid.

Keeping it safe and legal

Raffles and lotteries

There are different types of lotteries and raffles. They all must be run and managed in accordance with the rules issued by the Gambling Commission. For the most up to date information, please visit gamblingcomission.gov.uk. Alternatively, you can sign up to play Autism Hampshire's own lottery on the website.

Collections

To collect money in public spaces you might need a street collection license. Visit gov.uk/street-collection-license for all the details. If you are collecting on private land, you'll need permission from the landowner or manager.

Events

Different types of events will have different guidelines and licensing requirements depending on the services being offered (sale of alcohol or type of entertainment for example). Please check with your local council to ensure you

have the necessary permissions in place before the event takes place.

Food events

Please ensure wherever food is sold, you are complying with the current government food safety guidance. We recommend visiting the Food Standards Agency website before planning and food related activity at www.food.gov.uk.

Photo and data consent

Please only share photos with us if you have the appropriate consent to do so. Please contact our fundraising team at fundraising@autismhampshire.org.uk to obtain our consent forms.

First aid

If you're holding an event involving lots of people, please make sure that you have appropriate first aid support in place. You can get advice from <u>St John Ambulance</u> or the <u>British</u> Red Cross.


